SRB Nominated

SRB Communications earned an Emmy nomination for producing a 30-second public service announcement to warn Maryland residents about the dangers of using Fentanyl and Xylazine.

The Maryland Department of Health partnered with Maryland Public Television and contracted with SRB to create and execute a statewide public education campaign. SRB produced 30-second television and radio PSAs in English and Spanish, as well as digital and print campaign assets.



Aaron Working on Vet Housing Story

In early September a federal judge in Los Angeles handed veterans a major victory in a case **John Aaron** has been involved with over the course of 17 years. He plans to continue telling the story of this struggle as a book and/or documentary and is seeking the advice of producers or literary agents who might be interested in hearing more.

The VA facility in Los Angeles is the largest in the nation. The original 650 acres of land were donated to the United States in 1886 for the "permanent maintenance of a Home for disabled soldiers." Over the years the land was systematically despoiled and

reduced to about 365 acres by a succession of corrupt local and federal politicians, indifferent Congresses, the public and complicit bureaucrats at the Veterans Administration and its successor, the Department of Veterans Affairs.

The homeless veteran crisis is still endemic across the country. In an age when a distressingly large portion of the population agrees with the proposition that veterans are "losers and suckers," John feels compelled to continue telling the story. Al-Mohamed's Latest at REACH - 9/29

Day Al-Mohamed is the series creator and senior producer of AMERICAN MASTERS: RENEGADES, a collection of five short films that will be broadcast by PBS. She coordinated 30+ filmmakers with disabilities in 5 teams to make the digital shorts. You have a chance to see their work at a free screening in the Justice Forum at the REACH, Kennedy Center on Sunday, Sept 29 at 3:00 pm. **Make your reservation here**.

RENEGADES showcases the lives of little-known historical figures with disabilities, exploring their contributions to U.S. society and unique elements of disability culture. The series is hosted by



musician and disability rights advocate Lachi. The five historical figures were selected with an eye toward diversity of disability, gender, race, geography, time period, and field, embracing intersectional identities, and featuring three profiles of men and two of women, and four profiles of people of color, as follows:

- Thomas "Blind Tom" Wiggins (1849–1908): The first African American composer and pianist to perform at the White House, Wiggins was blind and autistic. He toured throughout the U.S. and Europe—yet because he was under guardianship, Wiggins received only \$20 per month.
- Daniel Inouye (1924–2012): A veteran who lost his right arm in WWII while serving in the U.S. Army's 442nd Regimental Combat Team, Inouye represented Hawai'i in Congress for more than 50 years.
- Judith Lynn Del Rey (1943–1986): As an editor, Del Rey, a woman with dwarfism, brought us books from science fiction luminaries such as Ray Bradbury, Isaac Asimov, Philip K. Dick, and even George Lucas' Star Wars. Del Rey's chosen genre, science fiction, offers a unique lens through which disability can be reframed and recontextualized.
- Brad Lomax (1950–1984): A civil rights and disability rights leader, Lomax's life story is one of care, community, and compassion. In the 1970s, in Oakland, the Black Panthers were providing free breakfast for kids and a health clinic; only a few miles away in Berkeley, disabled people were organizing for their right to live independently.
- Celestine Tate Harrington (1955–1998): Born without limbs, Harrington impressed audiences with her skill at playing the electric keyboard with her tongue. In 1975, the City of Philadelphia took away her baby daughter, claiming she could not provide adequate care. Harrington successfully defended her right to parent. In the courtroom, she demonstrated her skills—dressing and undressing her daughter, and changing her diaper, using only her lips, teeth, and tongue.

According to historian Douglas Baynton, "Disability is everywhere in history, once you begin looking for it, but conspicuously absent in the histories we write." Join us at the REACH on September 29 and learn more about these RENEGADES.
