Through the 9-month WIFV Narrative Script Development Fellowship accomplished film professionals will work with 4-6 Fellows to take scripts from page to production. The WIFV Documentary Development Fellowship program, exclusively available to members of WIFV and members of Filmmakers with Disabilities-Documentary (FWD-DOC), is entering its second year. This program will give documentary filmmakers a safe space to learn about the ecosystem for indie docs during a nine-month program of 3-4 workshops/month to support fellows in taking a documentary idea from early stages to closer to production.
