



CURED Available for Streaming on Various Platforms

An award-winning documentary from WIFV member **Patrick Sammon** is now available for streaming on various platforms. The Emmy-nominated **CURED**, which is co-directed by Sammon and LA-based filmmaker Bennett Singer, takes viewers inside the David-versus-Goliath battle that led the American Psychiatric Association to remove the diagnosis of homosexuality from its manual of mental illnesses in 1973. WIFV member **Julianne Donofrio** served as a co-producer on the project. CURED attracted 1.5 million viewers during its US broadcast premiere on the acclaimed PBS series Independent Lens. The film is now available to stream on Prime Video, **iTunes** and Xfinity. You can also watch it in-flight on **American Airlines** through next June.

On January 5th, episode #089: "Art Amidst Adversity: From Ukraine to Venice" - Host Tara Jabbari speaks with Zhanna Ozirana, a Ukrainian filmmaker whose first feature film premiered at the Venice Film Festival. They talk about the inspiration behind her film, the importance of art showcasing challenges like war, winning the Biennale Cinema Competition, and much more.

Then on January 19th, episode #90: "Stories that Reframe Aging and Celebrate Older Women" - Host Candice Bloch talks with documentary filmmaker Melissa Davey about her latest feature, Climbing Into Life. WIFV Mentorship Program Application Deadline January 10

Applications are now being accepted from WIFV members seeking to be paired with an industry professional. You can apply for a mentorship for a specific project or for general career mentorship. **More info here**. **Apply to be MENTORED by clicking here**

Mentorship engagements usually require one hour per month virtually via Zoom. The WIFV mentorship program has been tremendously effective in its first few years and the committee's goal for 2025 is to increase the number of mentorship pairings to serve even more WIFV members.

WIFV Narrative Script Development Fellowship Deadline February 10

Through the 9-month WIFV Narrative Script Development Fellowship accomplished film professionals will work with 4-6 Fellows to take scripts from page to production. WIFV Documentary Development Fellowship Deadline February 17

The WIFV Documentary Development Fellowship program, exclusively available to members of WIFV and members of Filmmakers with Disabilities-Documentary (FWD-DOC), is entering its second year. This program will give documentary filmmakers a safe space to learn about the ecosystem for indie docs during a nine-month program of 3-4 workshops/month to support fellows in taking a documentary idea from early stages to closer to production. DC.Camera Grant Deadline March 3

DC.Camera wants to assist a WIFV Member working with a local, non-profit client or on a local social issue, whose project would benefit from access to a camera package to support a specific media project. Send your client's non-profit mission statement or description of the proposed social issue topic you are producing, along with the information below and projected production timeline including number of segments and total days needed for gear. The period of access to equipment is limited to 4 production days and no more than 2 check-outs.

Not every camera or every lens in our inventory is available, Focus your request up to mid-level camera and lenses. Their inventory can be found at www.DC.Camera to assist with your request. The equipment request must be completed within one year of notice of

the grant. Deadline for submissions is 5:00 pm (Eastern) on March 3, 2025. Incomplete applications will not be considered. **Application form available here**.
