


FELICIA PRIDE Writer/Producer/Director

Oscar-nominated director and cinematographer **Rachel Morrison** first emerged as a refreshing voice at the forefront of independent cinema, and has since built an extensive body of work, channeling each story's core emotion into arresting imagery. For her work on MUDBOUND, Morrison became the first woman ever to be nominated for an Academy Award for Best Cinematography. She is also the first woman to lens a Marvel superhero movie, the box office smash BLACK PANTHER. Morrison's feature debut, THE FIRE INSIDE was released theatrically in December 2024 by MGM. Robin Noonan-Price has been working with DC metro filmmakers on short films for more than 10 years. Her most recently directed short film, GLORIA'S BIRTHDAY, is screening in festivals. TELL ME ABOUT ORANGE, a short she directed, was included in the Starz Telling Our Stories competition in 2021, selected from more than 800 entries from around the world. Robin recently produced her first feature films, THE OTHER YOU (Alexandria, VA) and STREGA NONNA – A Sicilian Witch Tale (Chicago, IL). More info here.

Felicia Pride is a TV writer/producer and an award-winning filmmaker. She wrote on Ava DuVernay's QUEEN SUGAR and was most recently a producer on GREY'S ANATOMY. She's currently developing shows with Amazon, Netflix, and FX. She's the writer/executive producer of REALLY LOVE, which became a Top Ten Movie on Netflix. She made her directorial debut with tender, a short film which aired on STARZ, and is currently preparing to direct her feature debut. She founded and manages HONEY CHILE, a production company catering to Black women 40+ and is the co-host of their NAACP-nominated podcast *Chile*, *Please*. **More info here**.

Gonçalves. In the film, Liat is one of the hostages taken on October 7 2023. The film follows her relatives from right up close, with a focus on her father, as he tries to stay on the path of pacifism and humanity amidst war, trauma and diplomacy.

Strachan is OCTFME February Filmmaker of Month

The DC Office of Cable Television, Film, Music, and Entertainment (OCTFME) is proud to recognize **Daria Simone Strachan** as the February 2025 Filmmaker of the Month. A Ward 7 native, Daria is a freshman at Loyola Marymount University, majoring in Film and Television Production.

Daria has already made a significant impact within the world of storytelling. As a former student member and intern with Women in Film and Video (WIFV), she worked closely with local filmmakers and produced documentaries for DC-based nonprofits, including the Anacostia Youth Media Festival's Documentary Project.

"At just 18, Daria is already amplifying underrepresented voices and fostering meaningful change through film," says OCTFME Director LaToya Foster. "Her dedication to storytelling is inspiring, and we can't wait to see

Daria's award-winning short film, AS YOU ARE, created through Black Girls Film Camp (BGFC), explores self-acceptance and belonging through the lens of a young queer girl navigating her religious upbringing. The film has earned multiple accolades, including:

- Best Short LGBTQ+ NYC Independent Film Festival
- Most Impactful Film BGFC 2024 Showcase
- Selections at Lady Filmmakers Film Festival, City of Angels Women's Film Festival, Micheaux Film Festival, the 2025 Pan African Film and Arts Festival in Los Angeles and the 2025 San Diego Black Film Festival.

"As a teen storyteller born and raised in Southeast DC, I am honored to be recognized by OCTFME," says Daria Simone Strachan. "Programs like the Anacostia Youth Media Festival and Black Girls Film Camp have been instrumental in my journey, and I hope this inspires other young filmmakers to seek support from these incredible organizations."

Beyond filmmaking, Daria is a community leader, receiving the 2024 Sophie, Live Out Loud Award from SMYAL and being named a Point Foundation - NBC Universal Flagship Scholar. Krell's Film Premieres at National Press Club March 7

The doc, RELIGION, RACISM, & RECONCILIATION will be making its DC premiere at the National Press Club on Friday, March 7th at 5:30 pm. The film explores how racism has



intertwined with American religion, focusing on

individuals and communities of faith working to address issues such as voting rights, income inequality, and mass incarceration. Through interviews with academic and religious leaders, it examines the contradiction of an American society that values freedom and equality while grappling with its history of slavery, segregation, and racism.
